SMALL BUSINESS COMPLIANCE GUIDE

Amendment to Subtitle 02 Fisheries Service

Regarding the Department's Regulations for Blue Crabs — Coastal Bays Commercial Crab Pot
Limits

COMAR 08.02.03.07D(6).

I. SUMMARY & FAQs

What is being considered?

The department is considering clarifying the 300-crab pot limit in Maryland's Coastal Bays COMAR 08.02.03.07D(6). Currently, the regulation states not more than 300 pots per day may be set or fished. The department is proposing to remove "per day" from this statement, to be clear that the total number of pots a license holder should have in the water in this region at any time is 300 pots.

Why is this change necessary?

Allowing crabbers to maximize the gear permitted by their license in Maryland's coastal bays of the Atlantic Ocean and their tributaries would likely lead to gear saturation and overharvesting in these waters.

Who will this affect?

This would affect commercial crabbers who crab in Maryland's coastal bays of the Atlantic Ocean and their tidal tributaries.

Has this change been discussed with advisory commissions?

This change was discussed with the Sport Fisheries Advisory Commission and Tidal Fisheries Advisory Commission at their July 2022 meeting. The commissions recommended moving forward with scoping.

What is the specific regulatory action?

Amend Regulation COMAR 08.02.03.07D(6).

II. RECORDKEEPING AND REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

This action does not create new permit, recordkeeping or reporting requirements.

III. IMPLEMENTATION DATE

The department expects this change to be effective in the spring of 2023, however the exact date cannot be determined. The department will follow our normal scoping and proposal procedures.

This idea is in the scoping process (August 1—August 15). During the scoping process, the department gathers suggestions and ideas from stakeholders and others about how to solve a fishery problem or address a need. The goal of scoping is to identify issues, potential impacts, and reasonable alternatives associated with the issues so that management actions can be developed. After the public has had an opportunity to comment on possible management actions during the scoping process, the department considers these comments and develops an appropriate management strategy.

If the action is necessary and appropriate, the rules will be promulgated following the Administrative Procedures Act described in Title 10, Subtitle 1 of the State Government Article Annotated Code of Maryland.

- The General Assembly's Administrative, Executive, and Legislative Review Committee reviews the regulatory proposal for fiscal and legal analysis.
- The proposal is printed by the Division of State Documents in the Maryland Register.
- A 30 day public comment period begins on the day of publication.
- After review of the comments, the department may adopt the changes.
- If the department adopts the changes, they become effective after a notice is published in the Maryland Register that announces approval and the effective date.
